He spoke movingly about his own period in his life when he was suicidal and also recalled his experience as a pop star, broadcaster, writer and clergyman. Much of his experience with parishioners resonates with what we do.

In particular he spoke movingly about grief and the expression of feelings over the recent loss of his partner.

We told him that he would make a good Samaritan and invited him to join us and he also confirmed that the Communards will not be reforming!

The Samaritans is increasingly involved in policy and advocacy work and was actively involved in the new Suicide Prevention Strategy for England which was published in September 2023. Other policy change includes the Online Safety Bill on restricting social media.

We welcomed Maria Caulfield, MP for Lewes and the Minister of Mental Health, who came to the Branch in June.

Maria showed considerable interest in what we do and how we do it and spent time in the duty room. The issue of the need for National Government support to measures to address suicide prevention at Beachy Head was discussed.

We have continued to work with **Lewes Prison**, providing support to the listening service with weekly visits to the prison supporting both the prison listeners and prison staff.

Samaritans updated its **Children's Policy in September** and we will continue to support Secondary Schools, raising awareness of what services we can provide and the provision of emotional support.

We were at the Big Futures Career fair for Sussex Secondary schools in February and at Heathfield Community College in June. There were further school visits in the Autumn term.

Face-to-Face is Important

We are one of the few branches in the South East of England that is open for face to face callers—from 10:30AM every day to 8:30PM.

We are receiving around 20 callers per month, the second highest in the country after Central London.

We receive both regular callers and occasional visitors. They all need our support and it remains a really key part of what we do. Importantly people in the Eastbourne region know that we are there if they need us.

Fundraising and raising awareness of what we do go together.

People see us in Eastbourne and want to know more about what we do. We are always amazed at how generous the public are and how successful our fund raising events have been. In the last financial year we raised £9,522 from events. Below some of the recent highlights over the summer.

Why are we still here after 70 years?

The Samaritan service is in increasing demand and this has not been helped by the recent events of COVID, the cost of living crisis, and the unstable world. We are now reaching out to new audiences and are present in different places.

Our growth is down to a simple thing-many people don't necessarily need professional help, they just want someone to talk to and help them through the problems that they are facing. We talk to people of all ages and from all walks of life and age on all issues: family, marriage, abuse, anxiety, bullying, stress, loneliness, depression. All calls matter and for many there is nowhere else to call to have a non-judgemental conversation.



Every 10 seconds, a Samaritan responds to a call for help.

Chad Varrah launched the service 70 years ago in the parish of St Stephen in the City of London as a '999 service for the suicidal'. In 1957 we became the first 24 hour helpline service in the world.

Our Listener service in prisons was started in 1991 and the partnership with Network rail in 2011. The freephone 116 123 number started just over 10 years ago. The service will continue to develop with new methods of reaching people.


In the meantime Eastbourne Branch is turning 60 in February 2025. Get ready for the celebration!
